OH NO FIVE-0 AND THE DARK WEB!

**A guide to prevention and education
with Law Enforcement, legal concerns
and victimization on the web.**

This course will provide introductory information on how to best prepare for an incident dealing with a family member, client or staff and law enforcement. Preparation before a crisis situation is critical for both law enforcement and the provider or caretaker in order to provide the person with PWS the best service and positive outcome possible. This class will teach parents and professionals various ways to accomplish this and how to best work with law enforcement so that officers have a knowledge base about your child or the residential home and their clients. Information will be provided on how to contact law enforcement and what information should be provided and when. Additional topics will include legal concerns when a family or a staff member is accused of a crime that results in an investigation or arrest; What to do when the person with PWS is arrested or being investigated for a crime and understanding law enforcements responsibilities and expectations, along with civil remedies that may allow for an alternative to criminal charges. Finally, a brief look into issues with the web, social media and the concerns of victimization for an alternative to criminal charges.
